Below, you will find a list and reimbursement information regarding many of the common requests we receive at Kushner & Company. Obviously we cannot list every item, but this guide should provide you with some additional knowledge regarding what is and is not eligible for reimbursement under the Health Flexible Spending Accounts (FSAs) and Health Savings Accounts (HSAs). If you are enrolled in an HRA, this list may not be applicable. Please see your plan’s Summary Plan Description (SPD) for more details. Remember too that reimbursable expenses are those Medical Care Expenses that are incurred **“for the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease, or for the purpose of affecting any structure or function of the body.”** Expenses that are dual purpose must pass the “but for” test, which means that an expense would not have been incurred “but for” the medical condition causing its use.

Effective January 1, 2011, Over-the-Counter (OTC) drugs/medicines are only reimbursable with a prescription from your doctor.

AA Meetings	Yes. AA Meetings are eligible expenses	
Abdominoplasty	No. Abdominoplasty, also known as a tummy tuck, is not eligible for reimbursement	
Abortion	Yes. If the abortion is legal	
Acid Controller	Prescription Required. Acid Controllers are eligible with a prescription from a physician	OTC – Prescription Required
Acne Treatments	Prescription Required. Because acne is considered a disease, the cost of acne treatment will generally qualify, although acne medications must be prescribed, even if available without a prescription. However, the cost of routine skin care (face creams, etc.) does not qualify. See Cosmetic procedures; Toiletries; Cosmetics; and Dual-purpose expenses.	OTC – Prescription Required
Activated Charcoal	Prescription Required. Activated Charcoal is eligible with a prescription from a physician	OTC – Prescription Required
Acupressure	Doctor’s Note Required. Acupressure is eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity	
Acupressure Equipment	Yes. Acupressure equipment is eligible. Examples: Mats, wrist bands	

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Acupuncture	Yes. If it treats a medical condition.	
Adaptive Equipment	Yes. Adaptive Equipment reimbursement is eligible	
Administrative Costs	No. These aren't considered to be medical care.	
Adoption—Medical Expenses	Yes. For medical expenses incurred before an adoption is finalized, if the child was a legal dependent when services were provided. (Non-medical expenses incurred in connection with adoption assistance may qualify for purposes of taking a credit for adoption assistance or for reimbursement under an adoption assistance program.	
Air Conditioner	Doctor's Note Required. It must be primarily used by the person who has the medical condition. If it is attached to a home, only the amount spent that is more than the value added to the property can be reimbursed. Also, if others benefit from the air conditioning, only the prorated amount allocable to the person with the medical condition is reimbursable. See Capital expenses and Dual-purpose expenses.	
Air Filter	Doctor's Note Required. Air Filters are eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician	
Air Purifier	Doctor's Note Required. Eligible only if recommended by a medical practitioner to treat a specific medical condition such as a severe allergy. See the special rules under Air conditioner; Capital expenses; and Dual-purpose expenses.	
Alcoholism Treatment	Yes. Amounts paid for inpatient treatment, including meals and lodging, at a therapeutic center for alcohol addiction are reimbursable. AKA substance abuse. Transportation expenses associated with attending meeting of an Alcoholics Anonymous group in the community would also be medical care if attending on a physician's advice that membership is necessary to treat alcoholism. Note, however, that not all expenses charged at such centers (particularly lavish ones) may be reimbursable. Also see Lodging at a	

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	hospital or similar institutions; Meals at a hospital or similar institution; and Schools and education, residential.	
Allergy Medicine	Prescription required. Examples include antihistamines, Claritin.	OTC – Prescription Required
Allergy Testing	Yes. Allergy Treatment is eligible	
Allergy Treatment Products; Household Improvements to Treat Allergies	Prescription required. Not eligible if the product would be owned even without allergies, such as a pillow or a vacuum. However, an air purifier or water filter necessary to treat a specific medical condition may be reimbursable. Also see Air purifier; Air conditioner; Capital expenses; and Dual-purpose expenses.	OTC – Prescription Required
Aloe Vera	Prescription Required. Aloe Vera is eligible with a prescription from a physician	OTC – Prescription Required
Alopecia Treatment	Doctor’s Note Required. Alopecia Treatment is eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician. However, normal male pattern baldness treatment is not eligible, if the sole purpose is to enhance appearance as this would be considered a cosmetic expense.	
Alternative Healers, Treatments, Dietary Substitutes and Drugs and Medicines	Prescription Required. Non-traditional healing treatments provided by professionals may be eligible under certain circumstances, but the IRS looks at them very closely. The treatments must be legal. And the expenses are not reimbursable if the remedy is a “food or substitute for food that the person would normally consume to meet nutritional requirements.” It now appears that drugs and medicines recommended by alternate healers can qualify as medical care, although drugs and medicines must be prescribed by an individual legally authorized to issue prescriptions in the applicable state in order to qualify. Alternative healers include holistic and natural healers. Also see Chinese herbal doctor & herbal treatments; Christian Science practitioners; Special foods, Vitamins and Dual-purpose expenses. Artificial Reproduction/Insemination	Yes. Artificial Reproduction is if it is used to overcome a legitimate medical condition that prevents conception. However, these medical conditions aren't completely limited to women. Whether a male or female is a consumer spending account holder, the couple's reasons for choosing artificial insemination will be covered as long as they relate to a medical issue that interferes with a couple's ability to conceive.	
Asthma Medicine	Prescription Required. Asthma Medicines are eligible	
Asthma Oxygen Flow Monitor	Yes. Asthma Oxygen Flow Monitors are eligible	
Athletic Bandages, Braces, Tape, Elastics, Treatments	Yes. These are eligible. This includes ankle braces.	
Athletic Mouth Guard	No. Athletic Mouth Guards are not eligible	
At-Home Drug Test	No. At-Home Drug Tests are not eligible	
Automobile Modifications	Yes. If for physically handicapped persons. To show that the expense is primarily for medical care, a note from a medical practitioner recommending the item to treat a specific medical condition is normally required. For example, the cost of window tint recommended by an optometrist for an individual with eye sensitivity to light would qualify. Expenses of operating a specially equipped care (other than for medical reasons) do not qualify. But see Dual-purpose expenses and Capital expenses.

Bariatric Surgery	Yes. Bariatric Surgery is eligible. AKA Gastric Bypass or Lap Band Surgery. Excess Skin removal associated with surgery is also eligible.

Behavioral Modification Programs	See Schools and education, residential and Schools and education, special.

Blood Storage	Doctor's Note Required. Blood storage reimbursement is sometimes eligible if it is needed to treat an existing or imminently probable disease. A Letter of Medical Necessity is required. This includes cord blood storage.	
Blood Sugar Test Kits and Test Strips	Yes. As diagnostic items, these items are primarily for medical care. Also see Diagnostic services and Screening tests.	
Body Restoration Technique	Doctor's Note Required. Body Restoration Techniques are eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician	
Body Scan	Yes. Also see Diagnostic services and Screening tests.	
Bonding of the Teeth	Doctor's Note Required. Bonding of the Teeth is eligible with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician	
Books, Health-Related	Doctor's Note Required. Books are eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician	
Botox	Doctor's Note Required. Botox is eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician

Expenses of improvements or special equipment added to a home (for example, an Elevator or Inclinator) or other capital expenditures (such as Automobile modifications for a physically handicapped person) may qualify if the primary purpose of the expenditure is medical care and the expense would not be incurred "but for" this purpose. How much is reimbursable depends on the extent to which the expense

Even though insurance premiums are deductible as medical care on a tax return, health FSAs are prohibited from reimbursing them. See Insurance premiums.	
Cocoa Butter and Oil	No. Cocoa Butter and oil is not eligible	
Co-Insurance and Deductible Amounts	Yes. If the underlying expense would be reimbursable if entirely paid by the individual.	
Cold Cream	Prescription Required. Cold Cream is eligible with a prescription from a physician	OTC – Prescription Required
Cold Medicine	Prescription required.	OTC – Prescription Required
Cold and Hot packs	Yes. If used to alleviate a specific medical condition. Such items are primarily for medical care.	
Cold Sore Medicine	Prescription Required.	OTC – Prescription Required

Collagen Injections	Doctor's Note Required. Collagen Injections are eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician

Constipation Treatments	Prescription Required. Constipation treatments are eligible with a prescription from a physician	OTC – Prescription Required
Contact Lenses, Materials and Equipment	Yes. If the lenses are needed for medical reasons. If so, materials and equipment needed for using lenses (such as saline solution, cases and enzyme cleaner) are reimbursable, as is distilled water used to store and clean the lenses. Contact lens insurance would not be reimbursable, however. See Insurance Premiums.	
Contraceptives	Yes. Health FSAs are permitted to reimburse medicines and drugs that meet the definition of medical care, including medicines purchased over the counter as well as prescription drugs. Examples include birth control pills, condoms, Norplant insertion or removal and spermicidal foam.	
Controlled Substances in Violation of Federal Law	No. If the substance violates federal law (e.g. the Controlled Substances Act). If so, the expense is not reimbursable even if a state law allows its use with a physician’s prescription and the participant gets that prescription. See Illegal operations and treatments.	
Convalescent Home	Yes. The cost of medical care provided in a convalescent home or nursing home (ex. Following a hospital stay or surgery) is a qualified medical expense. This includes the cost of meals and lodging in the convalescent home if the main reason for being there is to receive medical care.	
Cooling Gel Sheets for Fever Reduction	Yes. Cooling Gel Sheets are eligible	
Co-payments	Yes. Qualifies if the item or service is an otherwise eligible medical expense.	
Corneal Keratotomy and Ring Segments	Yes. Corneal Keratotomy and ring segments are eligible	
Cosmetics	No. These are used primarily for personal purposes. Cosmetics are articles that are intended to be rubbed, poured, sprinkled on, sprayed on, introduced into, or otherwise	

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	applied to the human body for cleansing, beautifying, promoting attractiveness, or altering the appearance. Examples include skin moisturizers, perfumes, lipsticks, fingernail polishes, eye and facial makeup, shampoos, permanent waves, hair colors, toothpastes and deodorants. Also see Toiletries; Cosmetic procedures; Personal-only expenses.	
Cosmetic Procedures	No. This means any procedure (including cosmetic surgery) that is directed at improving the patient’s appearance and doesn’t meaningfully promote the proper function of the body or prevent or treat illness or disease. There is an exception, however, for procedures necessary to ameliorate a deformity arising from congenital abnormality, personal injury from accident or trauma, or disfiguring disease—these may be reimbursable. Also see Breast reconstruction surgery following mastectomy; Dual-purpose expenses; Personal-only expenses	
Cotton Balls & Swabs	No. Cotton Balls and swabs are not eligible	
Cough Suppressants, Syrup, and Drops/Lozenges	Prescription required. Also called expectorants.	OTC – Prescription Required
Counseling	Doctor’s Note Required. If it is for a medical reason, then yes. Marriage counseling, career counseling, life coaching, and parenting skill counseling generally won’t qualify. Also see Psychoanalysis, Psychiatric Care, Psychologist; Dual-purpose expenses; and Personal-only expenses.	
CPAP Machines and Equipment	Yes. CPAP machines and equipment are eligible. Examples include hose holders, masks, headgear, pillows, and cleaning products.	
CPR Class	No. CPR Classes are not eligible for reimbursement with a flexible spending account (FSA) and health savings account (HSA).	
Cranial Sacral Therapy	Doctor’s Note Required. Cranial Sacral Therapy is eligible for reimbursement with a

Dancing Lessons	Doctor's Note Required. May be reimbursable if recommended for a specific medical condition (such as part of a rehabilitation program after surgery). See Dual purpose expenses; Personal-only expenses.	
Decongestants	Prescription required.	OTC – Prescription Required
Defibrillator	Yes. Defibrillators are eligible. This includes Automated External Defibrillators (AED)	
Dehydration Treatment	Prescription Required. Dehydration Treatments are eligible with a prescription from a physician with a flexible spending account (FSA) and health savings account (HSA)	OTC – Prescription Required
Dental Care	Yes. Includes fees for X-rays, fillings, braces, extractions, dentures, etc. The reimbursable amount is limited if the treatment includes pre-payment for services that haven't been provided. Also see Pre-payments	
Dental Emergency Kit	Yes. Dental Emergency Kits are eligible	
Dental Maintenance Organization (DMO) Fees	No. DMO Fees are not eligible	
Dental Reconstruction	Yes. Dental Reconstruction is eligible	
Dental Sealants	Yes. Dental Sealants are eligible	
Dental Veneers	Doctor's Note Required. Dental Veneers are eligible for reimbursement with a Letter of Medical Necessity from a physician. Only eligible if they are required for dental treatment and not for a cosmetic purpose.	
Dentures and Supplies	Yes. Including denture adhesives, cleaning supplies, stain cleaners.	
Denturist	Yes. Amounts paid to a denturist for	

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	treatment of a dental condition are eligible	
Deodorant	No. See Cosmetics; Toiletries; and Personal-only expenses.	
Dependent Care Expenses	No. But see Disabled Dependent Care Expenses.

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Transportation Costs of Disabled Individual Commuting to and from Work	No. These are personal expenses not for medical care.	
Transportation and Travel Expenses for Person Receiving Medical Care	Yes. If the expenses are primarily for and essential to medical care. These include car expenses, bus, taxi, train, plane, subway and ferry fares and ambulance services. Invoices will need to be provided for these items. Instead of actual car expenses (such as fuel), a standard mileage rate (19 cents for 2016, 17 cents per mile in 2017, 18 cents per mile in 2018) is reimbursable for use of car to obtain medical care. In order to be reimbursed for mileage, a copy of MapQuest or Google Maps showing the distance from point A to point B must be supplied with the claim. The price to rent a car is also reimbursable. Parking fees and tolls can also be reimbursed.

Vitamins	No. If they are used to maintain general health (e.g., one-a-day vitamins). Yes, under narrow circumstances, if prescribed by a medical practitioner for a specific medical condition (e.g., a prescribed dosage of Vitamin B-12 daily to treat a specific vitamin deficiency). Because this is a dual-purpose item, a medical practitioner's prescription evidencing that the pills are used to treat a specific medical condition is advisable.
